Traditionally IELTS has been the gateway to University

- Now INTO GCU is coming under increasing pressure to adapt to fit the needs of the students and the University.
- Large scale testing is no longer a viable option.

What is the portfolio approach?

- Does large scale testing have a fitness for purpose?
- Stakes are high for INTO GCU to produce criterion based exams which do their job

Awareness of the limitations of its use

Limitations of one off testing

 Portfolio approach allows teachers to see what the students are capable of.

 Limitations of one off timed writings are most apparent in the portfolio approach Characteristics of a model portfolio

GCU "owns" the EAP module.

Importance of validation

Implementation is a work in progress

Comprehensiveness of the portfolio

 A driving factor is the need to be flexible as the EAP outcomes can be complex.

 With more emphasis on student led learning it gives the student control over their learning Implications

 Washback – students may be unsure of the rating system as used to exams in own culture.
